November / December 2015 A.D. – THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR

Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As I write these thoughts, the celebration of Christ the Lord's birth on Christmas Day is still over 2 months away. However, I have seen and heard some pretty heavy duty retail advertising already. This year there were some Christmas ads on TV and Christmas displays in some stores by the end of September!!

When a person cuts through all the mumbo-jumbo of this very early trend to advertise by many in the retail arena, you are able to discover why. And it's a four letter word: FEAR -- fear. Most are afraid because about 1/5 of the people in our country want to have their Christmas shopping done before Thanksgiving Day. Therefore, the sellers believe that the sooner they can get us to buy some gifts to give at Christmas the better off their bottom line will be.

When you read and hear again the accounts of Christ the Lord's birth in Matthew 2 and Luke 1 and 2, discover anew that there is much **fear** in these Christmas story accounts.

When the angel appeared to Zechariah in the temple, "fear fell upon him". So the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid". When the angel Gabriel spoke to the virgin Mary, "she was greatly troubled". So Gabriel told her, "Do not be afraid, Mary". When at first Joseph was trying to figure out what to do with Mary, an angel spoke to him in a dream. Joseph was told, "Do not fear to take Mary as your wife".

On the night when the Christ Child was born, the angel of the Lord appeared to some shepherds who were out in the fields with their sheep. "They were filled with fear". So the angel said to them, "Fear not". And when Joseph was to bring Mary and the Christ Child back from Egypt, "he was afraid to go there". Then the angel of the Lord directed Joseph to go to Galilee instead of Bethlehem.

Our lives too are filled with **fears**, and we are **afraid** of certain things as well. Most of these **fears** have to do with the unknown, or they often come when we get discouraged. That's what happened with Zechariah, Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds.

Fears rise up in our lives because of our sinful human nature. The devil loves to get our minds and hearts and eyes off the hope that we have through Jesus Christ and the sure promises of our Lord and Savior. I sense a certain amount of fear in many of the conversations about the future of St. Timothy Lutheran Church when I hears things like "what's going to happen to our congregation?" or "can we survive?".

All of us must stop and listen again to God's Word to us in the Christmas story: <u>"Don't be afraid"</u>. All those events with Zechariah, Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds were written down for our instruction. God never lets His children down even when they have some **fears**!

By faith in Jesus Christ we have hope for this life and for the life to come because of the redeeming work Christ the Lord came to do for all people. And we can face the future with all its unknowns, clinging to the promises of the Lord including Jeremiah 29:11. "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans for wholeness and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope".

May the Lord grant each of you not just a peace filled Christmas, but may each day of your life be filled with the peace that passed all understand that comes through faith in Jesus Christ.

May the love of the Lord Jesus always be in your heart!

Council Report - Mel Suelzle

September 30th marked the end of our first quarter of fiscal year 2016. The financial results for this 3 month period is shown below. Our contribution income is well off our plan at only 85% or \$4,081 less that we had expected. This trend continues as we experience member attrition without a corresponding level of new members. Expenses, being more stable, were slightly below our plan at 96%. This helped to offset some of our lower income result, but still left us with a net shortfall of income after expenses of \$2,441 for the first quarter of our fiscal year.

As I stated during our voters meeting on October 11th, if this trend continues, this deficit of approximately \$800/month would add another \$10,000 loss for the year. This is in addition to the \$12,000 deficit that we approved in the June voter's meeting when the budget was submitted. The good news? This is only the first quarter. We have 9 months of our fiscal year left to change the trend.

PROPERTY SALE UPDATE While our sales activity on our property started with a bang, for various reasons, none of the initial offers cleared the feasibility periods common for sales of undeveloped property. Recent information on sewer costs has resulted in a lowering of offer prices and the pending offer includes an easement on our parking lot to mitigate the sewer expense. Since this is outside the scope of our original discussions, it was necessary to address this new requirement at our October 11th Voter's meeting. A motion to allow the committee to include this easement in a sales

CONGREGATIONS, I thoroughly enjoyed the information and fellowship shared at the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty's conference in Washington, D.C. As an ordained minister and executive director-elect of Lutherans For Life, I also was encouraged by our gathering under the theme, "Let's Talk Life, Marriage and Religious Liberty."

I and the several dozen other attendees got to know each other as Lutheran leaders and

others engaged the gathering in candid
conversation about confessing the
faith in the public square in a
uniquely Lutheran way.

action-takers over the course of two-anda-half days (though it felt more like we received a whole week's worth!) of lectures, receptions and chapel services. We celebrated the work of some of our Washington-based laypeople in the arenas of policy and ethics, such as Rep. John Shimkus (R-Ill.), Rep. Dr. Larry Bucshon (R-Ind.), Sen. Ben Sasse (R-Neb.) and journalist Mollie Hemingway (thefederalist.com), as well as Beltway veterans Mr. Timothy Goeglein (Focus on the Family) and Mr. Bill Hecht. The presence of four select young ambassadors (two from Concordias and two from state universities) gave special pride and hope.

A further joy was connecting and sharing with like-minded Christians of other denominations. Keynote presenters for the conference were Dr. Ryan T. Anderson and Mr. Sherif Girgis, who are distinguished and eloquent public faces of our culture's recent marriage debate. Multiple lawyers from Alliance Defending Freedom's D. C. office also briefed us on the state of the three issues we considered. Dr. Barrett Duke of the Southern Baptist Convention's Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission

brought warm greetings from that church body.

The distinctly Lutheran emphases, embodied in regular worship and doctrinal exhortations by LCMS President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison, LCMS Vice President Rev. Dr. Scott R. Murray and LCMS Vice-President and conference Chaplain Rev. Christopher Esget were certainly the highlight of our time together. As I have been given the responsibility and privilege of leading current and coming Lutheran generations to witness to Christ as the Way, Truth and Life, I am excited and strengthened to walk, work and serve shoulder-to-shoulder with these brothers and sisters. The environment the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty advocates and enacts - a safe, orderly, fair and free society - is surely the kind in which the Gospel may best be proclaimed and prosper.

Senator tells LCMS losing tax-exempt status due to religious liberty infringement would be "a devastating blow" by Adriane Heins

N A RECENT Free to be Faithful-sponsored webinar, Senator Mike Lee (R-Utah) today told LCMS members that if churches were to lose their tax-exempt status, it could "be a devastating blow from which they would not recover."

"It would make it difficult, if not impossible, for our churches to do good things" in their communities, Lee explained. He is co-author of the First Amendment Defense Act (S. 1598, H.R. 2802), legislation that would, as the bill notes, "ensure that the Federal Government shall not take any discriminatory action against a person, wholly or partially on the basis that such person believes, speaks, or acts in accordance with a sincerely held religious belief or moral conviction that marriage is or should be recognized as the union of one man and one woman, or that sexual relations are properly reserved to such a marriage, and for other purposes."

One of the key components of the bill involves allowing churches, faith-based charitable organizations and schools to continue to care for those around them without threat of government retaliation.

Losing the right to religious freedom "would be catastrophic to so many churches and charitable organizations," Lee acknowledged. "We can't allow them to be subjected to unfair retaliatory treatment as a result of their beliefs. "

Lee, who hopes to see movement on the bill yet this fall, had a final word of encouragement for LCMS members: "It's important for us to get the word out that the American peo-

> ple are free, that the sons and daughters of the United States of America were meant to live in freedom, that in our worship of the Lord, Jesus Christ, we demand to be free from retaliation from our government."

NE OF THE GREAT JOYS in life is being surrounded in our nation's capital by men and women of faith who are passionate about exploring the role of Christians in the public square — fellow Lutherans who are intrigued by Jesus' admonition that we are to "render unto Caesar" those things which are the government's yet to "render unto God" those things which are His.

That was the animating, absorbing narrative of the LCMS's recent Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty meeting in Washington, D.C.; it turned out to be an often breathtakingly interesting three days just a few blocks from Capitol Hill and the Supreme Court.

We heard from, absorbed and interacted with experts on the cutting-edge public policy questions of marriage, human life and religious liberty questions. There was ample time for unsurpassed conversation and discussion but also beautiful worship and praise to leaven our time together led by Rev. Christopher Esget of nearby Alexandria, Virginia.

As a band of brothers and sisters in Christ, we learned that while we live in a world that seems to have ample amounts of genius, there is often too little courage on the great questions of our time: What constitutes marriage, what is a family, how should we defend our God-given

religious liberties and conscience and how can we play a significant role in the burgeoning pro-life movement?

The theme was "Let's Talk Marriage, Life and Religious Liberty," and the nourishing, refreshing first principles were held up to new light for a new era and an altogether new chapter of American life. The stakes for Lutheran Christians could not be higher.
