## April / May 2018 A.D. - THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR

Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia!

Each of us has wondered or said out loud "what if ..?" What if we can't pay the rent? What if I can't get my homework done? What if we get hit in an auto accident? What if ...?

It is interesting that you and I could come up with all kinds of "what if" questions. However, there is one "what if" that you and I don't have to worry about -- what if Christ had not been from the dead?

In 1 Corinthians 15, (the great resurrection chapter of the Bible) the Holy Spirit moved Paul to tell us disciples of Jesus Christ what it would be like **IF** Christ had not been raised from the dead:

- 1) our preaching would be in vain;
- 2) our faith would be in vain, totally useless;
- 3) we would be misrepresenting God;
- 4) we would still be in our sins;
- 5) those who died believing in Jesus would have perished;
- 6) we would be the most pitied of all people.

It was by the power of almighty God that Christ Jesus was raised from the dead. Jesus lives! The victory is ours — the victory over sin, death, and the grave, because Christ has risen victoriously. Thanks be to God that you and I believe by faith that Jesus Christ was raised from the dead to life.

Because we don't have to worry or wonder "what if Christ had not been raised from the dead?", we celebrate the resurrection of our Redeemer on each and every Sunday. As we are able, we join together in worship with our brothers and sisters in Christ to listen to the words of our living Lord. We sing His praises. We thank Jesus for His goodness to us. We receive His precious body and blood often in remembrance of Him and for the forgiveness of our sins. We pray in His victorious name.

The risen Christ Jesus is also the center of our everyday living in this world. We're thankful that Jesus is the center of our living as we remember His ascension into heaven (May 10<sup>th</sup>) 40 days after His resurrection where He now intercedes for us before the throne of almighty God. As His disciple by faith, we rejoice that by God's grace we are part of Jesus' flock as we remember that we're part of His New Testament church which was born with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost (May 20<sup>th</sup>).

Hold onto 1 Corinthians 15:20 (ESV). Treasure it. Memorize it. Take it to heart. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia!

May the love of the risen Lord Jesus always be in your heart!



This year will be #8 for me working on the grounds of St. Timothy Lutheran Church. I started in 2011 when Steve Wilson quit. I was a downgrade for Rodger as Steve Wilson had worked the grounds of a 14 acre cemetery. The equipment was old, but Steve was a mechanic and could fix it. Rodger could say, "Steve we need to \_\_\_\_\_\_." Off Steve would go to start the job. The first couple years, I told Rodger, "I understand the words, but I don't understand the meaning." He had to show me what he wanted done, and even then, the quality wasn't up to the

When I wore a younger man's clothes, I worked in the Augsburg College Library. I started in 1982. The following year, another man joined me named Dan Malloy. He had earlier worked the grounds of Augsburg. He said, "Working the library is a HUGE upgrade. Outside it is hot, humid, the dirt sticks to your sweat, and you get eaten alive by mosquitos." Luckily, we have no mosquito problem, but one time some bees didn't like me when I started to trim into their hive!

The LCMS has some strict rules about some jobs. Our pastors and elders MUST be men. Other than that, jobs are gender neutral. When I first started, I looked for a job that was pass/fail. Pastor Patterson said that the Alter Guild needed people to help set up for Communion. I thought: Well, as long as the wine and waffers are out, I'm good. Bea Z. laughed at me and said, "Doug, that is the LADIES Alter Guild."

St. Timothy is more labor challenged than when I first started coming at the end of 2008. Years ago, Mel said that if a person could take even a part of a position, to step up and do it. It was good advice, which is how/why I am a Communion Assistant. Rodger, Carol and I are friends, and we actually have a common background outside of grounds. We also worked public education. Rodger wrapped up his career as a custodian after landscaping. Carol was a school cook. I got to deal with the brats in the classroom, but knew that good lesson plans eliminated 90% of the disciplinary problems. Very quickly though, I went to summer school to pick up an ALA-MLS. It was a lot easier working a public library 50 weeks out of the year, than to be in a classroom for 40. A lot safer too!

Volunteering for new positions helps to form new friendships, and allows us to grow as Christians and as humans. So if there is a job that the Holy Spirit is telling you to volunteer for, please do it. I sucked the first year on grounds, I thought maybe I'd quit, but there was no one else. It was year #3 that Rodger would mention a task, and I would think: Wow! Now I know what he wants me to do! So, think about volunteering for a new position.





# LWML Sets 2017-2019 Mission Goal at \$2.075 Million

ST. LOUIS, June 26, 2017 — The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) welcomed 3,471 people with 850 as first timers to the LWML Convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, June 22–25, 2017, under the theme "Jesus Christ Above All." The convention theme was based on Philippians 2:9.

Delegates to the 37th Biennial Convention of the LWML adopted a \$2,075,000 mission goal for the 2017-2019 biennium. This goal, by the grace of God, will fund 22 mission grants as men and women respond in prayer and offerings during the next two years. LWML chose to support the following mission grants, pledging their support with prayers and mites (offerings) given over the next biennium:

- 1. Providing Food and the Gospel to Starving Children Mercy Meals of Siouxland, \$40,000
- 2. Mercy House for Women and Children Franklin Avenue Mission, Flint, Michigan, \$100,000
- 3. Christ for Veterans and Their Families LCMS Ministry of the Armed Forces, \$27,750
- 4. Tanzanian Sewing Center Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT), \$25,000
- 5. Current Missionary Need LCMS International Mission, \$100,000
- 6. Lutheran Children's Books for Families Worldwide Lutheran Heritage Foundation, \$100,000
- 7. Christian Hope Through Mass Media in Egypt Lutheran Hour Ministries, \$100,000
- 8. NOLA 4H: Hearts for the Hungry, Homeless, and Hurting Christian Families United for Progress, \$100,000
- 9. Lutheran World Relief Quilt and Kit Shipping Fund, \$80,000
- 10. Christian Eldercare Home in Haiti Ministry in Mission, \$100,000
- 11. Training Lutheran Middle Eastern Missionaries Biblical Orthodox Lutheran Mission, \$93,000
- 12. Completion of Lukonda Lutheran School Buildings, Uganda Lutheran Church Uganda, \$48,000
